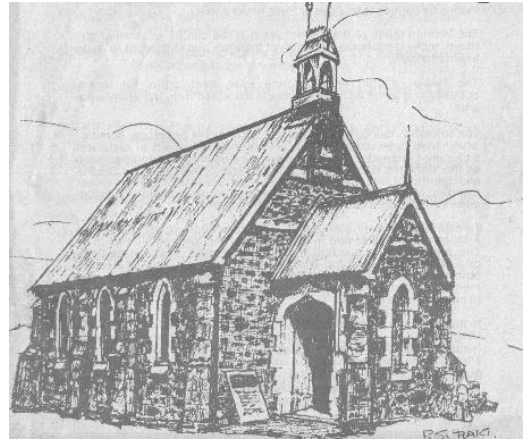

Presidents Report

Hello everyone and welcome to the first newsletter of 2023, this is Chris Ainsworth reporting in as your new newsletter writer. Following our recent AGM we now have myself as president, Jenny Haigh as Secretary and Judith Matthews remains our Treasurer.

Thank you, Maureen, for all your hard work that you have put in over the last few years as president and also for compiling the newsletter for over 30 years. Maureen's time as president saw some big events such as the major disruption of COVID-19, the answering of innumerable research inquiries, the installation of our stylish new lamp out the front and the Historical Society's 50th year celebrations in October which were a great success.

In case you haven't met me yet I've been a member of the Historical Society since about 2015. I'm particularly interested in the Cree family whose house I live in now and also the history of the Bannaby area where I grew up. My earliest memories of Taralga are living at Frank and Winnie Connor's house called 'Woolbrook'.

Our new secretary, Jenny, is relatively new to Taralga having moved here with her husband, Peter, in 2020. They are in the process of renovating Margaret Hillen's house and interestingly Jenny is a descendant of the Denning family.

I'm sure you're all familiar with our treasurer Judith Matthews who has kept an eye on our bottom line for quite a few years now.

Display Cabinets.

Thank you to Peter Haigh for securing a grant of \$3000 to go towards some new display cabinets. The funds came from the ANZAC Community Grants Program. These will go in the Nissen Hut to house military uniforms. They will help to preserve the aging fabric of the uniforms but will also display them to better effect as the cabinets come equipped with inbuilt LED lighting.

Ross Donation.

We have recently received a donation of multiple items which have come from Malcolm Ross. This includes hundred of letters dating from the 1840s to the 1970s, as well as photos and family history research papers for the Ross and Raynor families. Also included is the loan of a WW1 military uniform belonging to Donald Ross. Fortunately, this coincides with the arrival of our new display cabinets so the uniform will be shown in its full splendour. Thank you, Malcolm.

100 Years ago in the Archives - Taralga Show March 1923

The Taralga Show was held on Thursday 8th and Friday 9th March 1923. Details of the show were reported in the Goulburn Evening Post on 10 March 1923. It was stated that the show "proved a veritable triumph over heavy odds", as Taralga was experiencing a serious drought at that time, and on top of that, three well-known local residents had been buried during the week, resulting in some stock not being brought in for the show. Despite all of this, show entries created a new record.

Vale Ernie Stephenson; 30th October 1930 – 4th February 2023.

This February we said goodbye to one of our long-time members, Ernie Stephenson. Over the years Ernie devoted a lot of time towards the Historical Society.

Ernie read the opening speech for the Taralga 200 years events in 2019 and kicked off the procession down the main street. Here's his speech from that day with details of his beloved bullock wagon the restoration of which he oversaw:

"...Today it gives me great pleasure to be able to see Taralga celebrating its 200th year. I'd like to tell you a little bit about myself and the bullock wagon we have here at the Historical Society.

I was born in 1930 and grew up at Bannaby during the final days when bullock teams were in regular use. Seeing these impressive animals doing their hard work and the skill of the teamsters left me with a lifelong interest in this method of goods transport which was essential to the early pioneers of the area.

The bullock wagon that you see here was built in around 1900, we know this as the dates are stamped on the axels. It was owned by the pioneering Hillas family of Bannaby and would have been used to cart their wool through the Swallowtail Pass to Marulan and to bring essential goods back.

Although it looks well used it didn't see a great deal of work as it stopped being needed for wool carting through to Marulan when the train line came to Taralga in 1926. Soon after this motorised transport replaced the bullock wagon to get the wool to the station.

As a child I spent many hours sitting on the wagon while it was in the Hillas family's wagon shed at Bannaby. I recall it last being used in about 1950 by the Clack family to cart firewood to the various properties owned by the Hillas and Jamieson families. The Clack family were always the bullock wagon drivers at Bannaby.

As the last bullock teams disappeared from the area it sat at the Bannaby shearing shed for many years before making its way here to the Historical Society. In the late 1990's I organised some funds and a restoration team to bring the wagon back to working condition. We sent the wheels to Bungendore to be reconditioned, new stringybark timber for the frame was cut at the Cordingley property at Big Hill, this was then milled here in Taralga by Steve Connor and then the restoration was finished off by Maurie Nicholson and John Dodd.

It gives me great satisfaction to see it restored and back in working condition. I used to stop and eat my lunch on it as a boy while I was moving sheep from the Wash Hole at Bannaby to our property at Bright Hill on Strathaird Lane. Back then I never thought I'd see the wagon taking part in a parade down Orchard St. Today sees the culmination of not only my interest in this wagon but also all the hard work done by the people who helped restore it.

The bullock team and wagon are a symbol of the hard work and pioneering spirit of the early days in Taralga. In light of this I would like to unveil this plaque which commemorates 200 years of settlement in the Taralga district. I hope the strength and skill you see on display here today inspires you all with the great Taralga spirit".

We remain indebted to Ernie for all the help he has provided over the years and his willingness to share his knowledge with us.

Vale Mary Mooney; 24 October 1929 - January 15 2023

Mary Mooney (nee Maginnity) was born in Melbourne, the eldest of 6 children of Francis and Enid Maginnity. The family later moved to Tooma, where Mary spent her early life. It was here that her love of the outdoors and horses developed.

Mary was heavily involved in horses and also played polocrosse. It was through her involvement with horses that she met Kevin Mooney at the Sydney Show. Mary and Kevin married at Albury in 1954, and settled at "Mooneyvale" on the Richlands Road.

Mary became involved in many aspects of Taralga life, including the Progress Association, Garden Club, AP&H Show, Art Show, Sunset Lodge, Taralga Rodeo and Campdraft, Pony Club and Taralga Showground Cooperative. She also wrote the "Taralga News" column for the Wednesday edition of the Goulburn Post for some 20 years. Nothing escaped her weekly column. (Almost everyone bought the paper each week just to find out what was happening in the district).

Mary was a foundation member of the Historical Society. Her ideas and hard work were of great benefit and her job as publicity officer let members know when there were working bees, excursions, meetings etc happening. She always managed to share some history of the district in her weekly newspaper column.

Mary passed away peacefully in a Corryong aged care facility on January 15th , aged 93. She is survived by her siblings Tom, Brian, Colin, Pauline and Noeline and her many nieces and nephews.

Historic Homes - Glen Isla renovations

Over the coming issues I'll be talking with people who are working on historic buildings around Taralga. My first visit takes me to the shores of Burra Lake where Kate, Adrian and Oliver Keith are planning on renovating Glen Isla.

This property was originally part of the Richlands estate and was acquired by Charles and Barbara Keith in 1910. They applied for it via a ballot system and although larger now the original land area was 253 acres, enough room to set up a dairy.

Charles and Barbara set about building a house and farm structures employing the Cordingley Brothers to do the stonework. Tom Cordingley being the stonemason and his brother Joe the labourer, they camped onsite in a tent as the works progressed. The stone was quarried nearby on the property.

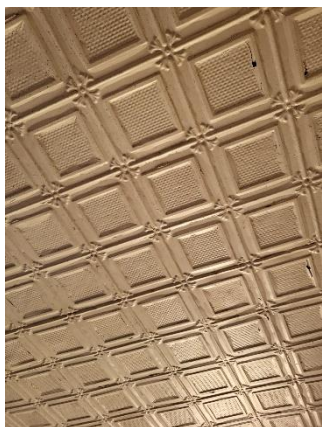
The house is a classic Taralga blend of Victorian and Federation features. Alexander (known as Ross) and Eileen Keith lived in the house after their marriage with their two sons Max and Charles. The dairy operation ceased in 1962 as farming shifted to sheep and cattle. Some interesting additions have been made to the house during the 1940's and 50's. This includes an inside bathroom and toilet along with a kitchen. After more than 100 years of continual use the latest Keith inhabitants are ready to update the house.



Things of interest I noted on this visit is how the front of the house is constructed with split faced basalt while the sides haven't been given as much attention. You'll notice the same at Wally Walsh's. The chimney bricks are different to the ones used around the windows, possibly a higher quality of brick to handle the heat. The tessellated veranda tiles have all survived intact along with some iron lace. Materials used in the building vary from late 1800's to the 1950s. This is obvious in the air vents, some are typical cast iron ones you would associate with Victorian era buildings, others are terracotta which would seem correct for 1910. The floorboards are original in some rooms, these may have been milled at Adavale however some have been replaced with closer fitting cypress, possibly during renovations in the 1940s. All pressed metal ceilings remain in good condition with a different pattern for each room. The house has had electric wiring added however the ornate ceiling roses suggest that there may have been an acetylene system installed for gas lamps. Perhaps the renovators will find some remaining lead piping in the roof to confirm this. Remnants of the garden remain including an English walnut to the west of the house which was one of the first things planted in the garden. Water was supplied for dairying and gardening purposes by a well and windmill (IXL brand) out the back.

Best of luck to the Keiths with this venture, have the kettle on in a year or so because I'll be back for a progress update.
